## "Back to Basics" With Rex.

The D'Aguilar Range District held a "Back to Basics" day last December, which was organised by King Scout Rex Williams (now 83 years of age). Rex was a scout during the war years, and helped make camouflage nets at the Wilston Scout Hall.

He showed Leaders from Near North Coast & Country Region how to make a Hammock and Trailer Net, Knotting Board, (explained how the knots were given their names eg. Sheet Bend, Bowline), Box Kite, plaited woggle (or belt), 'Klickty Klacks', and they made a grass rope which was strong enough to tow a 4WD vehicle – quite amazing.

The day concluded with an inside Campfire (due to the wet weather) and singing some very old scout songs, accompanied by guitarist John Starr. Some very funny skits were performed, with a 'Political Correct' version of Waltzing Matilda done by Rex and his helper, Craig Andrews.

Rex showed in miniature form, how to erect a 30 m high flag pole, and hopes to hold another day so that this activity can be done.

## **Robert Stephenson Smyth Baden-Powell**

1st Baron Baden-Powell OM, GCMG, GCVO, KCB

(22 Feb 1857– 8 Jan 1941), also known as B-P or Lord Baden-Powell, was a lieutenant-

general in the British Army, writer, and founder of the Scout Movement.

After having been educated at Charterhouse School, Baden-Powell served in the British Army from 1876 until 1910 in India and Africa. In 1899, during the Second Boer War in South Africa, Baden-Powell successfully defended the town in the Siege of Mafeking. Several of his military books, written for military reconnaissance and scout training in his African years, were also read by boys. Based on those earlier books, he wrote Scouting for Boys, published in 1908 by Pearson, for youth readership. During writing, he tested his ideas through a camping trip on Brownsea Island with the local Boys' Brigade and sons of his friends that began on 1 August 1907, which is now seen as the beginning of Scouting.

After his marriage to Olave St Clair Soames, Baden-Powell, his sister Agnes Baden-Powell and notably his wife actively gave guidance to the Scouting Movement and the Girl Guides Movement.

Baden-Powell lived his last years in Nyeri, Kenya, where he died and was buried in 1941.
