The Scouts organized a trip to the local Fire Station to complete their Fire Awareness Proficiency badge and part of the Campcraft/Emergencies requirements. They got more than they bargained for as the Fireies were ready for them. With three of the Fireies having been Scouts themselves, they prepared the burn pad and ensured the Scouts were well educated in the use of extinguishers. With the aid of the Scout Record Book, the Fireies were able to deliver a very in-depth information session which covered more than required.

After a thorough theory and quiz session, the Scouts were rewarded with a “hands-on” exercise which involved using various extinguishers in a controlled and safe environment. There wasn’t a flame left in sight. The visit ended on a competitive note when the Scouts issued a challenge to the Fireies in a “Sudden-death” basketball match. As the game ended with a draw, the Scouts are looking forward to a rematch on their next visit to the Station.

It is widely believed that the Fireies only deal with emergency situations, but some of their other roles include education and counseling. Some of the services they provide include: Fight Fire Fascination Program (aimed at kids who have an unhealthy fascination with fire), Fire Ed for all ages and RAAP (designed for adolescents who have just earned their drivers license). ## 1<sup>ST</sup> PORT MACQUARIE SCOUTS NSW HELP DARLING DOWNS SCOUTS

Following the recent inland tsunami and subsequent loss of life and property in the Toowoomba, Withcott, Murphy's Creek and Locker



Valley areas, the Darling Downs Scout Region was contacted by a number of Scout Groups from around Australia wanting to offer assistance to affected Scout Groups in the Darling Downs Region.

Together with offers of assistance from service clubs such as Lions, Apex and Rotary and the wider community Scout Groups have offered assistance both financially and in kind. Assistant Region Commissioner Barry Keleher said the Oakey Scout Group and the Withcott Scout Group were impacted to varying degrees. Oakey Scout Group had inundation of water above one metre. Withcott Scout Group suffered very minor damage to their facilities and resources. Sadly the Withcott Scout Group's greatest loss was their long serving Group Leader Bruce Warhurst. Bruce's tragic death also impacted on the wider scouting community as his wife Wendy is the Assistant Region Commissioner for Joey Scouts on the Darling Downs.

Scout, Cole Pearson from the 1<sup>st</sup> Port Macquarie Sea Scout Group in New South Wales has been working to raise funds to assist Wendy Warhurst and family. To this end Cole as a young Scout has sought sponsorship and organized and run a fete to raise funds. A substantial amount of money was raised at the fete.

Recently Cole Pearson and his father Bruce travelled from Port Macquarie to Toowoomba to present Mrs. Warhurst with a cheque for the funds raised. Cole has earned his Adventurer Cord and has almost achieved his Scout Medallion Award and he will be progressing up to the Venturer Scout Section soon. Cole has also developed a website for his Scout Group.

Assistant Region Commissioner for the Darling Downs Barry Keleher has congratulated Cole on his achievements. He said for a young scout to take on such a major fundraising effort to aid the Warhurst family after having just finished developing a website for his Scout Group is truly remarkable.

Cole is a credit to his family, Scouts Australia New South Wales Branch and the 1<sup>st</sup> Port Macquarie Sea Scout Group.

# Chief Commissioner

Over the last few days I have had the opportunity to complete the 2011 Census of the Queensland Branch for submission to National Headquarters and so I thought I would share some of the information from that census with you.

Firstly it is disappointing, although somewhat expected, that our Youth Member numbers decreased by 9.39% and our Leader numbers also decreased by 8.27% on the previous year.

Some of this decline in our Youth Membership is caused because the Group's invoice has not been paid by 31 March. This is understandable as Groups do not want to pay for young people who are not going to continue in the Movement and therefore resign them at census.

The other side of that equation is of course a number of those young people have not left the Movement, but have been late in paying the Group invoice. This results in an influx of Youth Membership applications for a couple of months following the end of the Scouting financial year. This has certainly been the case this year and I look forward to our Youth Member numbers continuing to grow.

It is also interesting when you look at the breakdown of age ranges within the various sections and the split between male and female members. The following table indicates these figures;

The other thing I want to talk about this month is the "Chinese Whispers" that always seem to be prominent within the Movement. During my travels over the May long weekend I was informed that the refurbishment of the Branch Headquarters was going to cost about \$1.8 million and that we would not be receiving any payment from our insurers.

**I want to state quite clearly that this rumour is totally incorrect.**

We did have flood insurance on the Branch Headquarters as we do with every single Scout building in Queensland. Because of the amount of devastation to the Queensland Scout Centre, we will receive from our insurers the limit of our flood cover. The cost to refurbish the building will be less than 25% of the rumoured figure.

The other thing I should stress is this will not cause large increases in our Youth Membership fees or our Facility and Activity fees and the commitment to the Movement that they will be increased by

no more than approximately CPI, remains in place.

We have also received some very generous donations towards the refurbishment of the Queensland Scout Centre and continue to look for avenues through which the cost of refurbishment of the Queensland Scout Centre can be diminished through the generous support of organisations and businesses.

Now let me say a few words about "local rules". As part of my activities over the May long weekend I visited the training courses which were being conducted at BP Park, to which approximately 70 Leaders were in attendance. I was absolutely amazed to hear some of the things which Leaders believe are policies of the Association, purely and simply because they have been advised by another Leader that this is the case and even worse, have heard it on the grapevine. The policies of the Movement are issued in two documents, firstly, the nationally published Policy and Rules and secondly, the Queensland Branch Scouting Instructions. Both these documents are available to Leaders within the Movement and in actual fact the Queensland Branch Scouting Instructions is issued on a CD to every new Leader who joins the Movement.

These two publications contain the only policies of the Movement. All of us need to be familiar with what is in those documents or at least use the documents as a point of reference. It is important that these rules and instructions are followed because they are the basis on which the Scout Association obtains its various insurance covers.

These rules and instructions are not there to make the game of Scouting more difficult. They are there just like the rules of football, soccer or netball, so that the players know the bounds in which the game is played.

In any sport which has a referee, when the referee blows the whistle we know that we have stepped outside the rules under which the game should be played. Scouting doesn't have a referee because it relies on each and every Leader within the Movement to be the referee, to know the policies and instructions or to at least have the common sense to do the research so that they know they are playing the game of Scouting within the rules.

The worst that can happen in the game of football is the referee holding up a red card and sending the player off the field. Unfortunately in the game of Scouting, playing outside the rules can result in a young person or a Leader being seriously injured. None of us want that on our conscience. I think the questions we all need to ask ourselves are –

Do we play by the rules?

Do we need to do something about it if the answer to the first question was no?

## YOUTH MEMBERS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Many times while I am attending Joey Scout training courses and activities I am asked about young people with disabilities and what scouting can provide for them.

In actual fact we can provide them with the same experiences that we can provide for any youth member. Sometimes we need to be a little innovative with way we present the programs but then all youth members have individual differences and we cope with those very well. The clue is to engage with the family members and be aware of their expectations, understand the needs of the child, be up front with what we can provide, be creative with your approach and ask for help if you need it. Bryan Brown at BHQ can point you in the right direction - 07 3870 7000.

I usually suggest to leaders that they plan with the family a time span that will give everyone involved an opportunity to measure how things are working, if anything needs to change and if the placement is the right one for all concerned. If it isn't the concerned parties need to decide what needs to change and how to go about it.

To help with this the Training department at BHQ is able to provide a weekend Disability Awareness course for leaders. It is not registered in the Training Calendar but it is possible to arrange for it to be offered. We feel that for it to be of maximum benefit there need to be about eight participants. If you are interested ring the Training Department at BHQ and leave your name.

Another help in this department is a book that has come from New Zealand and is sold through the Supply Centre at Branch. "A Resource for Youth Leaders and Teachers" – compiled by Alan Kempt for the Scout Association of New Zealand.

Topics it includes are – ADHD, Asthma, Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Diabetes, Down Syndrome, Learning Difficulties, Epilepsy, Muscular Dystrophy, Deafness and Hearing Impairment, Vision Impairment, Intellectual Impairment and more. It also provides information about games, wheelchair awareness, positive language stow, Muscular Dystrophy, Deafness and Hearing Impairment, Vision Impairment, Intellectual Impairment and more. I'd like to take a little time to quickly gloss over the three target levels of the award scheme and how they relate to the progressive training which is an inherent part of the Scout method.

**Pioneer** – achieved predominantly by participating and the acquisition of a small amount of new skills

**Explorer** – achieved by predominantly by the gaining of new knowledge and skills and beginning to instruct

**Adventurer** – achieved predominantly through instructing others

It can easily be seen how at each level the Scout is being exposed to experiences that will be expanded at the next level. I'm sure we're all familiar with the progressive nature of the award scheme but the topic I want to touch on is one that may present itself every now and then, a Scout wanting to skip levels.


There is an allowance to enter the target award scheme at any level but under normal circumstances a Scout should progress through all 3 levels. It needs to be pointed out that it is an allowance to ENTER at a level, not skip a level. The ability to enter at a higher level is dependent on the recognition of experience and ability and the philosophy of this approach is aimed at the older Scout joining the Troop. They do not have the right to skip levels and in the majority of cases if they are trying to prove their knowledge and experience they are then effectively completing that level of the award scheme any way.

By skipping Explorer level a Scout will miss out on learning most of the knowledge and skills they should be passing on as an Adventurer level Scout. This I believe is a major contributor to the decline in apparent skills within the Section when this is allowed to occur. I often wonder where all the Explorer level skills come from when a Scout wants to skip Pioneer to Adventurer?

If a Scout believes they need to jump ahead in levels to find a challenge then the Troop Council should be taking a good hard look at their program and how it can provide challenges to Scouts at all levels. Each Patrol should be well balanced with Scouts at all ages and award levels. They should be implementing their own program of activities and camps to suit their Patrols own needs. Concurrently, Leaders can be encouraging and enthusing Scouts to participate in the award scheme and all that the movement has to offer at all levels.

## Journey Guide Lines and Plan

Its here! The 2011 version of this document has now been released. It is available from the Branch web site or through your District or Region Leaders. Rather than being anything radically new, this document represents a refinement of its predecessors.



A lengthy process of consultation was undertaken so that we addressed a wide range of issues associated with Journeys across the state as well as ensuring that we are aligning ourselves with community standards.

Implementation of the new Journey Guide Lines and Plan will be immediate. However, if you have Scouts who are currently planning a journey under the previous document then they can continue to use that document up to the 30<sup>th</sup> of June 2011.

A trend that has been developing over the past years is the tendency to put together an ad hoc Patrol specifically for this activity. I'd like to discourage this process and instead look for ways send a natural Patrol on the Journey together. Under the guidelines there is a lot of scope for most members of a Patrol to be achieving something from a Journey if handled well. If it's not possible for one or two members of a Patrol to achieve something directly from the award scheme then they will still have the achievement of assisting other members of their Patrol and the delight of spending a couple of days outdoors. Sounds like something a SCOUT would do and I do seem to remember the words "help other people" from somewhere?

## SSS

By the time you will be reading this most of your Patrol Leaders should have received their application form for SSS. The influx of the Expressions of Interest by the due date this year has been fantastic and I thank you all for the part you played. It's not too late to be part of the fun yet but you had better get moving on it. If you have more Patrols wishing to go then please pass on a copy of the application to the PL. For those that supplied an email address, they will receive their application by email; the rest will be by snail mail.



In a number of cases the application was made by Leaders rather than PL's (*I do apologise to those that have 3 or 4 Patrol Leaders living with them and sharing the same email address*). I do ask that you pass the information on and put some trust in your PL's to organise themselves. Please guide and support them in this endeavour as I'm sure that it won't always be the well oiled machine we'd like it to be. See it as a great learning opportunity for the PL if there's a few bumps along the way.

Leader applications will be included in the Patrol's application. If PL's don't pass it on then you may need to give them a gentle nudge. Don't be too offended as I'm sure they were going to invite you along eventually. Leader applications will also be available on the Branch website for Leaders that aren't attached to Troops. This year will also see a definite cut off date for those wanting to avail themselves of the four star Leader catering.

This year SSS will be combined with CCC (Cubs Can Come). On Sunday we will be opening our camp up to Cub Scouts 9 ½ years old and over as well as Cub Scout Leaders. They will have the opportunity to wander around the site and see the Scouts in action as well as participate in some of our activity bases. Over lunch they can visit with a Patrol from their home Troop and experience a little of Patrol camping as well as getting to know a few Scouts. If they don't have a Patrol from their Group then I'm sure we can match them up with another one for lunch. Keep a look out as the details will be available soon.



## DETAILS IN RECORD BOOKS

While potentially at Venturer Award level and definitely at Queen's Scout Award level, Unit Councils will make use of external people to assess the work of a Venturer Scout, this does not mean the peer review process is excluded in those instances. The Unit Council, and for that matter anyone looking at a record book, needs to be presented with sufficient information to be able to form a mental image of what challenge was undertaken. If the Venturer Scout has additional records then that is wonderful, but the record book needs to be able to stand on its own as a description of what was done. The record book should tell a story, not just be a collection of examiner's signatures indicating unspecified tasks were completed to a satisfactory standard.

When your Venturer Scouts are noting their achievements in the record book, get them to take a few moments to compose a description of what they did that shows how they completed the requirements with a mind's eye on the scope of the particular tape. When the requirement for a citizenship item is to "take part in a group discussion on multi-culturalism/Australia's indigenous history/people with disabilities and how it relates to the Unit/Scouting/community" then paraphrase in a dozen or so words the message that emerged from the discussion so that in the future the proud Queen's Scout can look back and be reminded, for example, of that night at Venturer Scouts when the unit had that exciting discussion on how the community can respect and support people with disabilities. Recording "take part in a group discussion on people with disabilities" falls short of a meaningful record of achievement.

Similarly, when the requirement is to conduct "a Scouts' Own on a theme determined by the Group", encourage the Venturer Scouts who ran the ceremony record what the theme was, and if significant, the event at which the ceremony was conducted.

## EXPEDITION REQUIREMENTS

The scope statement for Venturer Award level Expedition requires a **minimum** of 12 hours of effort. The record book explains this by giving examples of different types of expeditions but the points in common are: "six to eight hours" of walking, canoeing, cycling or whatever per day; and "unfamiliar and challenging".

Remembering that "challenging" is a subjective term that requires the examiner to take into consideration the ability of the Venturer Scout being examined, the absolute level of difficulty will vary from expedition to expedition. What does not vary is that the party walks, canoes, cycles, (horse) rides for six to eight hours per day, in addition to whatever other challenges the examiner and the examined may agreed to include. There is no required distance such as 30km for walking or 60km for cycling as that may be too long for some Venturer Scouts, or too short for others.

The purpose of the expedition is to demonstrate to Venturer Scouts that they do have skills in navigating, cooking, packing, planning, being responsible for others when things go wrong, and generally fending for themselves without close adult supervision, at least for two days. They should finish the expedition believing it to have been tougher than they would have thought they could

manage, but elated that they rose to the challenge and succeeded. The expedition is where the stories that last a Venturer Scouts life-time originate. As Leaders, let's make sure that all Venturer Scouts live this experience.

### International Visitors - Reminder

Just a reminder to all members/ groups/ formations/ regions, if you have someone contact you from overseas requesting assistance, you should always refer this back to the International Team as we can check it out to see if they are legitimate and see if the request is reasonable. There are many people who prey on Scouting and their generosity. Many requests come from people claiming they are Scouts but they aren't registered. We have had two such instances in the last two months.

Additionally, if an international group wishes to travel to Australia and meet with you or organise an event, you should also contact the International Team so we can once again see that they are a legitimate group and are registered with WOSM. Once again we recently had a group coming to Australia and flights were booked, activities organised etc. This group were claiming to be Scouts but were not registered with WOSM. In fact they were using the Scout name illegally and pretending to be Scouts. What this means is that Scouts Queensland will not endorse such a visit and in fact will not permit our youth members to have any contact as we do not know anything about these people attending. Allowing such unauthorised visits may also contravene the Child Protection Act.

### In Closing

Being part of a world-wide brother and sisterhood is really exciting. You don't have to leave Australia to feel part of it. You can partici-

## SISEP EXCHANGE REPORT TO DENMARK

### Part 1 – Arrival & Christmas Experience

Travelling to Denmark began for me back in February 2010 when I sent in my application form which I got from the Scouts Australia International website. It was great to know that four of us would be adventuring abroad together to our chosen destinations. Suddenly, it was time to leave. It was November 28 and our flight left Brisbane in the morning. I was confused at how I felt, I didn't know whether to be sad or happy, whether to cry or smile; but I know that no matter what I felt, it would be the right feelings for that moment in time. The plane trip to Sydney seemed to take forever! A group of scouts no longer with leader supervision were making their way across to the other side of the world for what we would soon find out to be, the experience of our entire life!

After a flight that seemed to go so fast, we caught our first glimpses of Denmark and the snow that had completely covered the country! When we landed in Copenhagen, we all said our goodbyes and went our separate ways. For me, this meant another flight towards the northern part of Denmark. My new host family was the Olsen family from Fredericia. The moment I arrived at their house and saw them, I knew that this was the best decision made. My new host brother was Teis; he is 15 and just a little bit crazy. My host dad was actually my host evil step dad, Erik and he was a little bit crazier than Teis and my host mum was the best host mum I could have asked for, Lene. I also had two older brothers, Sune and Kaare who didn't live at home.

The lead up to Christmas seemed to take forever! However when December 23 rolled around Erik, Teis, Patrick, my Morfar and I went for a short drive just to the outskirts of Fredericia to chop down our Christmas tree! I never knew that this was a hard decision making process. The tree has to be perfect from root to tip, and have the right amount of branches to make up the perfect looking tree. As far as I'm concerned, going to Big W and buying one in a box is much less effort! We walked around this property with probably one or two hundred trees, trying to find

the right one. When we eventually found it, it was time to chop it down. Erik and Morfar did most of the work, and I soon found out why; chopping down a tree covered in snow is the hardest thing I have ever done. When I had a try and cutting it, I honestly think I got about 2mm into the tree, not much at all! The snow was cold, and my jeans were wet, so I took the opportunity to make my very first snow angel! This was really fun, but the challenge was getting up out of the snow without ruining the angel by putting feet marks in it...I failed at this task.

Christmas was very different to that of home. We woke up to any other usual day, shower, breakfast and cleaning the kitchen. Not much later, Sune and I sat down at the table to make some mini marzipan treats. This was fun, and we made such a mess! We ate these treats that afternoon with coffee. Throughout the afternoon, Lene was decorating the tree which no one was allowed to see until that evening after dinner. Before dinner, we played a Danish Christmas present game. This game involves placing lots of little presents in the middle of the table, not usually worth more than 20 krona. Then the game is played by means of cards which told each player what to do for that turn. We played two rounds of this game and in the end, I won a nisse doll, some food bag pegs and a bike bell (which Erik told me was so that whenever they were speaking Danish and I didn't understand it, I could just ring the bell, I loved that!). After the game, we had a very filling dinner which consisted of duck, sugar potatoes, red cabbage, normal potatoes and gravy. And for dessert we had Risa la Mande, rice pudding with warm cherry sauce. I loved all this food, and I loved the dessert even more! After dinner when we were all bursting with the amount of food we had eaten, we went into the lounge room where the tree was and sat down on the couches and sang some Danish Christmas songs. I didn't know what the songs said and I couldn't pronounce half the words, but I still sat and sang very quietly so that they didn't hear my saying all the words wrong!

After we had sung all the songs on the page, we all held hands and ran around the house singing another song. After this, Kaare, Teis and I put on Santa hats and played Santa, giving out the mound of gifts that were under the tree.




### The purpose of the Kokoda Challenge is

1. To educate youth and raise general public awareness of the gallant victory by Australian soldiers in 1942 on the Kokoda Track in Papua New Guinea – a victory which undoubtedly saved Australia from Japanese occupation
2. To identify young Australians who are at a crossroad and support them through a 14 month community counsel – The Kokoda Challenge Youth Program. This requires the participants selected to undertake a 14 month commitment to a community program, designed and supported by the Kokoda Challenge Association, which encourages participants to develop self-awareness within the wider community and prepare them for the challenges of life.

The Kokoda Challenge Youth Program culminates in the participants using the skills and training gained, to undertake the challenge of walking the Kokoda Track in Papua New Guinea

This is the first year that the Kokoda Challenge will involve primary school aged children. Numbers will be unknown until team registrations come in, looking at closing date to be before June/July school holiday. Promotion will be through Scouts, Guides, Primary Schools etc. both on the Gold Coast and Brisbane. Kokoda Challenge and Gold Coast Region Scouts will be advertised as joint partnership in organising this event.



It is envisaged that the teams divided into 3 levels based on their grade at Primary School



- Grade 1, 2 & 3 (Joeys Scouts and Cub Scouts in Grade 3)
- Grade 4 & 5 (Cub Scouts)
- Grade 6 & 7 (Cub Scouts and Scouts in Grade 6 or 7)

with 6 different Kokoda themed activities e.g.

- Obstacle Course
- Racksack races
- Relays
- Stretcher races
- Tunnel Ball

The day to end with a small Bush Challenge (mini Kokoda Trail) for the teams – about a 1km for the early primary children and a 3km track for the upper primary children. All team members will receive a T-shirt (organised by Southern Cross Uni) and pennant/medal for participation. Cost to the child to participate will be \$10ea, registration will be as a team (approx 4-8per team? tbc), each team must have a responsible adult with them (their team official).


